


**This is a BIG one!!!!**

Warm, it was not, mostly in the 50's with a short dip below and a brief rise above in the 60's. We stayed at the Grange Tower Bridge Hotel in London, which worked out well. **Guernsey of the Channel Islands & Cobh, Ireland**

Guernsey is an Island in the English Channel, off the coast of Normandy, and dates back to 1204. We arrived 6:00 AM on May 2nd. While approaching, we viewed the *Castle Cornet* which was built as a fortified castle between 1206 and 1256. After mooring off shore, we took a tour bus, which brought us to the "Little Church", the smallest consecrated Church in the World. It was created by Brother Deodat, in 1914, in spite of much criticism. There is a great deal of energy into saving the church. 

**Dublin, Ireland & Belfast**

May 4th, we arrived in Dublin and once again took a guided bus tour. Two of the main stops on the tour were *St Patrick's Cathedral* which dates back to 1191 with a great deal of history. There was a door set aside in the Cathedral, called the 'Door of Reconciliation', which told a story of how the church door was instrumental in making peace between two families at war with each other. The Cathedral was also full of beautiful stained glass, throughout. We also visited 'Trinity College' which dates back to 1592. Within the library of Trinity College is *The Book of Kells*, an illuminated manuscript Gospel book in Latin containing the four Gospels of the New Testament.



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Belfast is in Northern Ireland. We did not take any bus tours here, instead we went on shore and just walked around the town. In the picture below, you can see people relaxing on the lawns, steps to the building, etc. We thought it must be some sort of holiday or something? Well, the real reason is the sunny warm weather today is a rarity, as it is usually overcast, rainy and cool. People were taking advantage of the warmth. The monument in the next photo is a monument to the memory of the 'Titanic', as the ship was built here in Belfast.


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**Kirkwall, United Kingdom
